Spaying Neutering Vital For Rabbits

Rabbits that are not spayed can produce up to 2,000 babies per year. Since finding homes for so many baby rabbits is impossible, neutering rabbits is essential. Not only does spaying contribute to reducing the problem of rabbit overpopulation, it improves the health of female rabbits and the behavior of both males and females. Approximately 80% of female rabbits develop reproductive cancer before the age of three, but that risk, is much lower in spayed rabbits. Male and female rabbits that reach sexual maturity without being spayed or neutered often stop using a litter box, bite and/or spray urine. Even sexually mature same-sex pairs will display sexual behaviors and be aggressive toward each other.
